

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Character-Building Youth Sports

In the fall of 2011, Owen J. Roberts School District partnered with the Positive Coaching Alliance (PCA), a national non-profit organization whose goal is to transform the culture of youth sports. Since its 1998 launch at Stanford University by Founder and Chief Executive Officer Jim Thompson, PCA has impacted more than four million youth athletes. PCA's motto is, "Transforming youth sports so that sports can transform youth".

Owen J. Roberts has held 10 live workshops for district and community parents, coaches and athletes, and will continue PCA programming in the 2012-13 school year. The workshops contain research-based content from sports psychologists and the best practices of college and professional-level coaches of all sports. These workshops are changing the way sports are played, one school or youth team at a time. OJR is committed to seeing that all school district coaches, as well as community coaches receive the PCA Double Goal Coach Training. The most recent Triple Impact Competitor workshop was presented to 278 High School spring athletes on April 10, 2012.

PCA coaches youth and high school sport leaders, coaches, athletes, parents, and officials through live workshops, online courses, books and articles, and a series of alliances with nationally-recognized coaches, athletes, academicians, businesses and national youth sports organizations.

Three models are central to PCA's work: The Double-Goal Coach®, whose first goal is winning, and whose second, more-important goal is teaching life lessons through sports; The Second-Goal Parent®, who concentrates on life lessons, while letting coaches and athletes focus on competing; The Triple-Impact Competitor®, who strives to impact the sport on three levels by improving oneself, teammates, and the game as a whole.

Owen J. Roberts is looking to expand PCA programming, especially in the area of honoring the game. The Honoring the Game Code is simple, but powerful, and starts with self-control. Find out more at positivecoach.org.

Seat Belt Success

Teen driving safety was encouraged through many strategies this year including: an anti-texting and new driver laws presentation, site checks, and distribution of several types of handouts. Judging from observational surveys, these efforts seemed to make a difference. The percentage of OJR student driver seat belt usage increased over a three-month period.

Every year enthusiastic kindergarteners at North Coventry Elementary School plant seeds in some of the school's 24 raised beds. But this spring, health and physical education students, under the direction of teachers



Mr. John Sands and Mr. Chris Mitchell, were also energetically pulling weeds, working the soil, and planting.

Mr. Sands came up with the idea of incorporating gardening into the health and physical education curriculum after a conversation with volunteer parent garden coordinators, Anjanette Selvaggio and Deb Savage. "Mr. Mitchell and I explain to students the benefits of gardening and yard work as a form of life-time fitness. Benefits include stretching, weight-bearing activity, cardiovascular activity, burning calories, relieving stress, emotional well-being, and family interaction," says Sands, an avid gardener.

Most students approached the outdoor work with a positive attitude and did not realize how hard they were working. Sands stated, "I want the students to take away from this experience that weight training and cardiovascular exercise does not have to come from going to a gym or playing a sport. Also, this is a wonderful way to reduce stress in one's life." Gardening with students was so worthwhile, that next year Mr. Mitchell and Mr. Sands are planning for their students to participate in the "fit for life" activity in the fall and spring.

Note: Working in conjunction with the North Coventry Food Bank, South Coventry Township is lending a hand this summer by managing harvest distribution from several school district gardens. The township is making sure that the produce gets in the hands of those who need it. This collaboration is helping to create food security in our community.


East Coventry Field Day

French Creek Girls Win 1st Place in STEM Competition

This year sixth grade Academically Talented Program (ATP) students participated in eCybermission, an online STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) competition run by the U.S. Army as part of the Army Educational Outreach Program. The contest is open to six through nine students throughout the country. Olivia Foden, Leigh Magness, and Jane Minor identified the environment as their eCybermission Challenge, and developed a plan to improve recycling at French Creek Elementary School. Their plan to solve the real-world problem using Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics was awarded first place in Pennsylvania, and each student was given a \$500 prize.

The girls felt the French Creek recycling program was set-up as a great program, but they thought it could be more effective if students were better educated about cafeteria recycling opportunities. The girls designed and conducted a survey assessing what students knew about recycling lunch materials. Next, they created informational posters, table tents and other signs that they displayed in the cafeteria for several weeks. The girls conducted a follow-up survey several weeks later, and they found students were more aware of recycling opportunities at French Creek. The girls hope their efforts will encourage the students to be "more green" in the future.

Space Fair



The North Coventry Second Grade Space Fair was held on May 11, 2012 to celebrate the study of space. Students built skills in research, literacy, technology, and science while studying a unit on space. They were fascinated by the solar system and explored topics that interested them personally, such as conditions on planets. Students engaged in the learning process by working on space fair projects and sharing what they learned with others.

The Owen J. Roberts High School Jazz Band performed an evening of swing music for dancers at SwingKat in Pottstown on Friday, May 25.


Middle School Art Goes National

Hollywood-Style Awards for Student Films

With a focus on nurturing the creativity of high school filmmakers, the Greenfield Foundation and the Upper Dublin School District presented the fourth annual Greenfield Youth Film Festival. After months of work, Owen J. Roberts students submitted 29 films for the contest. The Hollywood-style awards ceremony at the Keswick Theater in Glenside, PA was attended by 1,400 people. OJR student Adam Ardekani won Best Picture Overall and Best Narrative Film for "Slice of Orange." Industry professionals and university professors chose Adam's film, out of 297 films submitted by Philadelphia area students, for this prestigious award. "Slice of Orange" also took top honors for Best Original Musical Score by Colin Gray. Beau Dallas wrote the screenplay and Matt Kiesling was the featured actor.

Two other OJR films were nominated in the top eight for Best Narrative Film. "License and Registration" was produced and directed by Ted Keffer, written by Blake Jarvis, filmed and edited by Matt DeSantis and featured the acting of Brett Levengood, Adam Ardekani and Mark Misciagna. Blake Jarvis took top honors for Best Screenplay for "License and Registration." "Roomies" was produced and directed by Ted Keffer, and written by Blake Jarvis. Another film nominated in both the narrative and documentary categories was, "Heroes of War," by Katrina Garthe.



Real World Problem-Solving Floats Their Boats

Students in Mr. Crowl's High School Computer Aided Drafting and Design 3 (CADD 3) course took on a new challenge this semester. They designed and constructed single-person kayaks. These flatwater kayaks were designed around traditional skin-on-frame kayak construction practices. For the kayak frame, they used PVC pipe in various diameters and lengths, rather than wood. The students covered the frame with canvas and coated it with layers of waterproof roofing paint.

The class planned the project by doing online research and creating a



prototype. For several weeks, everyone worked on the prototype, refining the design and mastering skills needed to build the boat. After the prototype was completed, it was tested in the middle school pool. With a successful test completed, students started working on their own kayaks. After more than a month of students working before school, in class, during study halls, and after school, the kayaks were ready to test in the pool again. After students demonstrated their boats were safe and dry, the class took a field trip to the Schuylkill River for a successful launch into open water.

Haiku Songs

Sixth grade students at West Vincent Elementary School completed an interdisciplinary unit in art and music classes. In art classes, Miss Allison Greet had students write original haiku poems and then illustrate them with tempera paint while listening to traditional Japanese music for inspiration while doing their work. Of the 65 pieces of artwork created, students selected three as inspiration for original student compositions. Using techniques studied in general music classes, students worked with Mrs. Alaena Silva to create songs. The final product, "Haiku Songs", was made up of three movements: "Winter," "Spring," and "Summer." It premiered as a part of West Vincent's Fine Arts Night on May 8.
