Message from Superintendent Michael Christian and the Board of School Directors

With the challenges of another unpredictable winter behind us, we look enthusiastically to a spring season full of wonderful activities and continued student development. The themes of evolution and renewal surround us. Progression is also evident in the work of the Owen J. Roberts Board of School Directors. Grounded in a history of providing rich educational opportunities for youth, the district has been deeply involved in consideration and forward-planning which address educational equity, aging buildings, and facility needs of school populations in rise and flux. The decision-making process has included many public meetings over the years as well as feasibility studies and Pennsylvania Department of Education PlanCon procedures. The board has been ever-mindful of striving for sound financial decisions in a fluctuating economy.

To understand the context on the progression of our district, consider that on February 13, 1954, Vincent Townships Joint Elementary School (East and West Vincent Townships) was officially dedicated in a ceremony addressed by the Honorable Supreme Court Justice Owen J. Roberts where he spoke of how "young children's lives will be so molded that their later life may be rich and full". The school, which evolved from a one-room schoolhouse, opened to 355 pupils, grades 1 through 8.

Today, 61 years later, there are two schools serving that same basic geographical region: the new West Vincent Elementary School, opened in 2008-09, with a current population of 579 students and the existing 1954 East Vincent Elementary School, which now houses about 529 students in grades K through 6. Our older school buildings, although retrofitted over the years, were not built for handicap accessibility, medical facilities, technology, individualized educational programs, interactive learning, summer programs or the full spectrum of after-school activities which are now part of today's opportunities for inquisitive youth. Today's student enrollment, academic expectations, and extracurricular programs have exceeded what may be provided within the existing facilities at East Coventry and East Vincent.

The Board is committed to addressing facility needs in full consideration of evolving educational strategies and 21st century standards of design, safety codes, and energy efficiency. After careful consideration of all pros and cons, on Monday, November 17, 2014, at the Owen J. Roberts Board of School Directors regular business meeting, the board voted to proceed with new construction for both East Vincent and East Coventry Elementary Schools.

We anticipate that new East Vincent and East Coventry Elementary School facilities will serve our students and their families well for another 60 plus years and will yield energy and educational efficiencies unobtainable with another round of remodeling. The cost of the new facilities will be funded without adding to the District's debt or



Arts are Alive at OJR!

It seems as though audiences never tire of hearing "Tomorrow". In February, Owen J. Roberts Middle School performed the family-friendly hit "Annie" selling out every performance as well as the "preview". "Annie" worked well bringing out the talents of over 100 cast and crew and, in addition a well-trained dog, as Sandy. Dual-cast lead roles (including "Annie") gave many students opportunities to shine.

Ten student crew members worked a "backstage ballet" moving set pieces and props under the direction of student stage managers. Students worked a minimum of ten hours of rehearsals a week from October to February with weekend rehearsals and community outreach activities.

Over 50 parent volunteers served behind the scenes on various committees and a two-man build crew constructed the entire set logging over 70 hours each both on and off-site! The community was amazingly supportive and gracious with donations. But most of



all, Director Mattie Moran, Assistant Director Katie Schollenberger, and Music Director Cheryl Markofski agreed, "There were countless smiles, laughs, and memories that will last for years to come for one-eighth of our middle school student body."

The ceremonial phase of NJROTC

inspection included march-on colors, the national anthem performed by high school choir members under the direction of Mrs. Sheila McIntyre, and pass-in-review. The Owen J. Roberts Unit earned a grade of “outstanding” for the inspection.



Unparalleled Odyssey Outcomes

Odyssey of the Mind has been an Owen J. Roberts tradition for nearly three decades and results continue to break records with more schools and teams competing and succeeding. Congratulations to the 11 Owen J. Roberts Odyssey of the Mind teams, who on Saturday, March 14, competed at Millersville University in the East Central Regional Odyssey of the Mind Competition. Of our 11 competing teams, eight moved on to the state finals contest in Berwick, PA on April 11th.

Three of our high school Odyssey of the Mind teams earned two first place finishes and one second place, which move them onto the state finals. Two of our middle school teams will move on in the competition through their achievement of one first place honor and a second place finish at regionals. Additionally, French Creek, West Vincent, and East Vincent Elementary all were first place finishers, qualifying them to move onto states.

In Owen J’s nearly three decades of competing in these problem solving contests, this is one of the finest outcomes in our history. Three teams advanced to be crowned state champions and qualify for World Finals to be held at Michigan State in May: the high school, middle school and East Vincent Elementary engineering teams.



38 Scholastic Awards

Owen J. Roberts art students hit it out of the park with the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards. Since 1923, the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards have recognized the vision, ingenuity, and talent of our nation’s youth, and provided opportunities for creative teens to be celebrated. Each year, increasing numbers of teens participate in the program, and become a part of a community of young artists and writers, filmmakers and photographers, poets, and sculptors, along with countless educators who support and encourage the creative process. Submissions are juried by luminaries in the visual and literary arts, some of whom are past award recipients. Panelists look for works that best exemplify originality, technical skill, and the emergence of a personal voice or vision. Students across America submitted 255,000 original works during the 2014 program year. Owen J. Roberts students won 38 awards at the regional level with six works moving on to national competition.

Strong in Science

Our elementary school students excelled again in science research. During the month of March, 85 students participated in the Chester County Science Research Competitions. These students were selected from their individual school competitions, and did a wonderful job representing our district at the county level. At the county level, each of our five schools received awards; our students collectively earned 13 awards with three students moving into the next round.

In the Salk competition, Owen J. Roberts sent 50 students claiming 25 awards from students in grades 4 and 5—many of the top awards. Each of our schools received awards; these awards were balanced among the areas of Biochemistry, Engineering, and Physics. There was no further competition for this level.

At the Delaware Valley Science Fair for middle and high school students, Audrey Farnham (MS) earned 3rd place in the Medicine and Health category for the middle school division. She was also invited to participate in the Broadcom MASTERS competition. Zoe Zabrenski (EC) earned 3rd place in the Zoology category for the middle school division, received the Future Scientist Award sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and was invited to participate in the Broadcom MASTERS competition. The Broadcom MASTERS competition is often described as the “middle school version of the International Science Fair.”

Call to Action

NOPE (Narcotics Overdose Prevention and Education) Task Force of Chester County provided an educational presentation on the dangers of substance abuse for parents and community members on April 7, 2015. The high-impact presentation was delivered to high school students in grades 11 and 12 earlier in the day.

The message was delivered graphically and emotionally from several perspectives. First, from a professional who describes the interaction of drugs on the developing brain; then from a law enforcement official who has the grim task of making death notifications to distraught families; and finally, from two family members who have suffered the loss of a child to a drug overdose. Throughout the presentation, compelling local stories of students who have lost their lives to drugs and alcohol are shared. The audience learned that the most common way children obtain drugs is from a family medicine cabinet.

The call to action at the community presentation was to lock up prescription medicines and dispose of any not being used. Within our district, North Coventry Township Police Department and West Vincent Township Police Department both have permanent medication collection boxes. NOPE urges each of us to discard unused medicines in a timely and responsible manner.

Fine Display

Owen J. Roberts students had a strong showing of inspiring pieces of art of various mediums walking away with 6 of the 15 awards given at the Montgomery County Community College 2nd Annual Tri-County High School Art Show January 20 to February 27, 2015. The show was held in the Fine Arts Studio, housed in the former Kiwi Shoe Polish Factory.

Students from public, parochial and private schools throughout the tri-county area were invited to participate in the exhibition. The artwork featured a variety of subjects and styles in an array of media. College art faculty members judged the artwork.

OJRHS art teacher Miss Tracey Schiavello was moved by the level of work the students have produced thus far this year. “I say it every year,” exclaimed Schiavello, “but I truly am amazed and inspired that the bar continues to go up on the quality of work our students produce—gallery level work!”




Science Kits

Read Across America



Summary General Fund Budget 2015-16

Although State and Federal support for education has consistently declined over the last two decades, sound financial planning has enabled the Owen J. Roberts School District to keep tax increases at or below the Act 1 Index for the last nine (9) years (1.9% for 2015-16). The 2015-16 Proposed General Fund Operating Budget is \$94,474,708, which maintains all current educational programs and provides additional opportunities for high school students to engage in several blended on-line learning experiences.

Fun with 24



Chester County Intermediate Unit is sponsoring a 24 Challenge® Math Tournament and many Owen J. Roberts players are excited to be a part of the educational initiative. This tournament hopes to provide students from all backgrounds with a common ground for learning, communicating, and embracing the spirit of competition. Playing the 24 Challenge® Math game, children may develop skills such as pattern sensing, problem solving, and mental math. The object of the game is to make the number 24 from the four numbers on a game card. Players may add, subtract, multiply and divide. Math enthusiasm, risk taking, and pattern discovery were evident throughout the tournament areas at French Creek, East Coventry and East Vincent Elementary schools as well as positive sportsmanship among the students. Each school sent four finalists to the county competition on May 1, 2015.

THON Exceeds Goal



Mini-THON is a year-long, student-run philanthropy effort raising money to fight pediatric cancer. The event is a twelve-hour dance, no-sit, no-sleep marathon held in high schools across the country. Students make a conscious choice to stand for those who cannot. A smaller version of Penn State University's event, the mini-THON raises money to support the Four Diamonds Fund, an organization that provides financial support to families affected by pediatric cancer. The first year, the mini-THON at Owen J. Roberts High School raised \$8,571.25. Last year students raised \$16,788! This year's February 28 event broke all records by bringing in \$32,717.

Hands-on Study

Dr. Heidi Lehmann, Science Coordinator, reported that close to 100 students, parents, and teachers from East Coventry Elementary School experienced a hands-on industry tour of manufacturing practices provided by the Omega Design Corporation. This was the second annual "Simple Machines" tour the company hosted for East Coventry. Third grade students studied the six simple machines as part of their Forces & Motion Science unit. The professional staff at Omega Design demonstrated scientific principles and provided hands-on exploration to students as they rotated through stations highlighting how various simple machines could be combined to produce complex machines used in manufacturing. Omega Design Corporation specializes in a variety of manufacturing functions serving pharmaceutical, personal healthcare, cosmetic, food & beverage, and household chemical markets. Omega Design hosted a tour for Owen J. Roberts High School students in April highlighting a wide range of career opportunities in the manufacturing industry.

Exemplary World Languages

Once again, Owen J. Roberts High School World Language Program has become part of a very elite group of exemplary foreign language programs as recipient of a 2015 Golden Globe Award. Exemplary PA world language programs are recognized at four levels: PSMLA Golden Globe, Silver Globe, Bronze Globe, and Globe Awards. Owen J. Roberts World Language Program is one of nine programs in the state to receive the highest Golden Globe distinction. The PEP Awards Showcase may be found at www.PSMLA.org.

According to their website, the Pennsylvania State Modern Language Association (PSMLA) annually seeks to identify and publicly recognize excellent foreign language programs across the state. The PSMLA Exemplary Program (PEP) Awards are given to schools with well-designed, sequential programs that enable students to attain world language standards, as demonstrated by documentation of 11 different criteria described on the PSMLA PEP Rubric.

One outstanding World Language program is the after-school Language Academy where high school students teach elementary students French, German, Latin and Spanish once per week for eight weeks. More than 150 elementary students were bussed to the high school after-school to participate in the program this year.

The high school World Language Department also maintains chapters of language honor societies for French, German, Latin and Spanish. On March 26, they held their annual induction ceremony inducting 100 new members. Senior members were presented their honor cords which they will wear with pride at the senior awards ceremony and graduation in June.

e-Cyber Success

The East Vincent Elementary eCYBERMISSION team, Aqua Squad, placed in the top three first places in Pennsylvania. They were then selected as an eCYBERMISSION Regional Finalist. eCYBERMISSION is a science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) initiative offered by the Army Educational Outreach Program (AEOP). According to their website, the U.S. Army is committed to answering the nation's need for increased national STEM literacy and expanding STEM education opportunities across the country to open doors to new career paths for America's students that lead to a brighter tomorrow. All mission folders are scored up to five times by eCYBERMISSION Virtual Judges on the following criteria: use of scientific inquiry practices, engineering design process, benefit to the community, and team collaboration. Study Initiated

The District is expected to see moderate growth in its student population over the next five years. New housing developments and resale of existing homes are causing shifts in demographics. With variances in population growth, an area of heightened consideration is the equitable distribution of students throughout Owen J. Roberts School District's five elementary schools.

In an effort to maximize student learning, as well as use resources efficiently, there will be a review of the attendance areas for our elementary schools over the next eight months. The Board of School Directors' commitment to build two new elementary schools (East Vincent and East Coventry) also makes this a fitting time for an attendance area study.

Approaching the process thoroughly, the District has formulated a working committee of administrators, teachers and parents to review the data so that all stakeholders have a voice. Recently, a participation survey was made available to all elementary parents. The committee will meet regularly and updates will be provided at regular monthly Board of School Directors meetings. Recommendations for changes, if any, will be presented to the Board of School Directors in early 2016, with projected implementation for the 2016-2017 school year.



Wildcat Athletic Highlights

The Wildcat Varsity Wrestling Team competed in the Southeast Regional Wrestling tournament. For the first time in school history, the Wildcats crowned three champions. Demetri D'Orsaneo, Derek Gulotta, and Xavier Ferrizzi all took 1st place. Dominick Petrucelli took 2nd place and Ryan Resnick took 5th place. All five of these wrestlers, a school record, moved on to the PIAA State Wrestling Championships in Hershey.



All five wrestlers won at least one match in the tournament. Derek made it to the semi-finals where he suffered an injury and was forced to default to 6th place. As a result Derek became the first wrestler from Chester County to earn four state medals and only the sixth wrestler from District One to accomplish this milestone.
