Last year West Vincent Elementary School students traveled to foreign lands through language with the help of Owen J. Roberts High School foreign language students. The collaborative program was so successful, that West Vincent Elementary School PTA decided to continue it this year.

As parent volunteer Mrs. Jean Gessl explains, the Foreign Language Club runs after school for eight weeks. During this time, high school students travel to West Vincent Elementary School to teach 45 minute classes in French, German, Latin, and Spanish. During the lessons the students learn simple conversational expressions, ordering in a restaurant, and discussing school-related activities.

"It is a wonderful opportunity for the high school students," World Language Department Chairperson Ms. Adrienne Andrés commented. "In addition to being responsible for preparing lessons and ancillary materials, they are practicing the basics of their second language."

After-school Program helps Students Reach for the Stars

East Coventry Elementary School is offering a new and exciting after-school program called R.E.A.C.H. (Resource for Enriching Afterschool Children's Haven). The program is designed to offer academic enrichment and target academic skills through highly motivating student experiences in a positive environment.

The first project is movie-making, which leaders hope will help to facilitate interactions between peers with different backgrounds. Future sessions will include horticulture, wellness activities and robotics. The program runs with the efforts of many District staff and community volunteers. For example, a minigrant from the OJR Education Foundation is supporting Eagle Scout Mark Wolff in his project to construct a greenhouse in the outdoor garden classroom. The greenhouse will allow the R.E.A.C.H. group to support local food pantries with fresh, nutritious food which they will help plant, grow and deliver.

"I am excited about the program," stated Principal Todd Oswald. "It synthesizes all the finest qualities and best practices of an after-school program: opportunity, enrichment, connections, rigor and engagement."

A new service-learning grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Education will provide resources to encourage students to solve problems in their own community.

Robotics Clubs are All the Rage at OJR

Robotics clubs started last year at the Owen J. Roberts High School with the for-



mation of FIRST Team 3123, which competed at the FIRST Robotics Competition with a 120 pound robot named "The Judge". The team had a fantastic rookie year winning the Washington, D.C. Regional Competition and then moving on to the World Championship held at the Georgia Dome in Atlanta. This year, the team will defend their title in Washington, D.C. and will also compete locally at the Philadelphia competition. As a result of this team's success, a Robotics class is being offered as an elective in the high school this next school year.

This year, robotics teams are starting elsewhere in the District as well. With strong support from Superintendent Dr. Joel T. DiBartolomeo, and Tech Teacher Mr. Giannone as their coach, FIRST Lego League (FLL) Team 7833 was started at the middle school and finished 10th in their regional rookie outing.

FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC) Team 4185 The Silver Soldiers, sponsored by OJREF, was also founded this year. This team is made of 8th to 12th graders and competes during the FIRST Robotics Competition off-season. They won the Rockwell Collins Innovate award at the SEPA Regional Competition and are moving on to the PA state finals. Working with the school administration and principals, the vision is to enable the creation of an FLL team or FTC team at all OJR schools within the near future.

Still Listening as District Future is Planned

A feasibility study is underway led by architect Mr. Jeff Chambers who meets regularly with a steering committee made up of representatives from each of the District's seven townships, regional planners, parents, residents, staff and administration. A town hall was held on February 3 where about 45 people gathered to speak out about their hopes and expectations for future District facilities. Information is still being gathered by way of survey and an interactive web page, http://feasibility.ojrsd.com. At this website, the PowerPoint presentation that was presented at the town hall meeting and the tabulated results from the meeting can also be found. Recommendations for long-term planning will be presented to the Board of Directors on behalf of the community by June.

Advancing Science Through Community Collaboration

Getting kids excited about science, engineering and other technical fields is a national priority and there is nothing like connection to authentic problem solving to ignite a young mind. Hoping to encourage budding scientists, East Coventry Elementary School takes a unique approach to the classic science fair through a partnership with pharmaceutical firm TetraLogic. TetraLogic scientists visit the school to help students formulate experiments and then return as judges. The partnership, recently featured in the Philadelphia Inquirer, may help give East Coventry Elementary School the highest science fair participation rate of all of Owen J. Roberts' elementary centers.

At the middle and high school levels, teachers and students benefit from the support of Science in Motion (SIM) through Ursinus College. SIM, a science outreach program, provides students with hands-on modern science and technology training. "It gives students a glimpse of what they can expect (from a science career)," offered Mr. Ron Faust, program director. SIM has consistently demonstrated its effectiveness to improve classroom science test scores by engaging students with high-tech equipment that a school could never afford and curriculum-based experiential discovery. In addition, colleges have been able to experience higher enrollments in the sciences by offering the program. The program is highly cost-effective because expert scientists and advanced lab equipment are shared by many schools.

First Friendly Face of the School Day

In our rural school district, most children are transported to and from school in a bus. Climbing those tall steps onto the vehicle, children are greeted by their first friendly face of their school day. Making their presence even more significant, school bus drivers are also the final school contact at the end of the day. That circumstance, coupled with the fact that nationally most bullying is reported to happen on the playground or school bus, puts drivers in a perfect position to act as responders to incidents of concern.

On February 18, Gross Bus drivers for Owen J. Roberts School District took part in the Olweus Bully Prevention program. More than 120 drivers received the tools to report and respond to situations that may con-



stitute bullying. "It is important to realize that bullying is defined as repeated malicious behavior over time," instructed certified Peaceful Schools, Olweus trainer and Springfield Township transportation director, Mr. Wayne Johnston. "We can't think we will eliminate bullying," Mr. Johnston, a 28 year transportation vet continued, "that just isn't going to happen. But you can become more aware." He confirmed that on a 72-passenger bus, drivers won't see everything, but they can teach kids to come to them with problems.

The Olweus Bully Prevention program, a blueprint for violence prevention, was first implemented at OJR Middle School. Many strategies are used at the school to promote pro-social behavior (and discourage anti-social behavior). Having kids understand what bullying behavior is and empowering them to report bullying to an adult at school and at home are hallmarks of the program. Students are also taught to include other students who are easily left out. Olweus strategies are now used universally in the District. All schools have a bully reporting system in place and now that friendly face driving the bus represents another person in the community to support efforts for kids to treat each other with kindness. Gross Bus Company paid the salaries of the bus drivers to take the conference and the District paid the presenter fee. "It is a great partnership," said Mrs. Gail Gola, OJR transportation coordinator.

Concerts Honor Black History Month

Choirs at the middle school and high school had an opportunity to work with famous African-American composer Dr. Rollo Dillworth to provide a gala community concert on January 28.

On Tuesday, February 15, elementary children at North Coventry and East Vincent elementary schools performed with internationally-acclaimed bass singer, Kevin Deas, and prominent author, Joseph Horowitz, as part of Black History Month assemblies with orchestra and music students in grades 3-6. Mr. Deas used his burnished sound to promote understanding of what at one time were known as "slave songs", while Horowitz explained to children the modern-day struggles of being a black opera singer. The entire program is an outgrowth of the National Endowment for the Humanities "Dvořák and America" Teacher-Training Institute hosted by the Pittsburgh Symphony in July 2010, where 24 teachers from across the US, including Hall, created Dvořák projects for implementation in their schools.



Orchestra director, Clifford Hall, developed an interdisciplinary curriculum using music and social studies to lead students in the processes of questioning, creating, performing and reflecting on the period of American history in which spirituals were born. Video Technology Helps EC's L³ Choose Project

As six East Vincent Elementary School fourth grade students waited for their first robot game round to begin, they began to express their doubt. They had spent months preparing for their rookie debut at the FIRST Lego League regional qualifier and facing off against an eighth grade team that literally tow-

Odyssey Mindset

The witty inventor Thomas Alva Edison once quipped, "To invent, you need a good imagination and a pile of junk". Harnessing this creative mindset, Owen J. Roberts' students gather each year to compete in the Odyssey of the Mind program. Odyssey of the Mind, fondly referred to as "OM" by OJR students, is a problem solving competition by definition, but at heart it is much more. OM brings people from around the world together to compete in yearlong problems. These problems, ranging from writing skits to building vehicles and balsa wood structures, put students imagination, knowledge, and skill to the test, while teaching them important life-skills including time management, peer interaction, and quick-thinking when under pressure. Problems in the 2011 competition include the creation of a vehicle made of mousetraps (Problem I), a Rube Goldberg machine (Problem II), a performance about a classical Tour Guide (Problem III), a balsa wood structure designed to fold together, then support weights (Problem IV), and, a performance about a character whose emotions come full circle (Problem V). All problems have an 8 minute time limit, but in no means a limit in imagination and creativity. Teams compete at regional and state competitions, as well as world finals, where students get the opportunity to interact with their peers from around the world, gaining invaluable social skills. Owen J. Roberts has problem solving teams at all educational levels and in every school in the district. Coaches include Ms. Patty Janda, Jyl Harrington, Rose Vey, and Mr. Christopher Palochak. The regional contest will be held this year at Southern Lehigh High School on March 19th, April 9th marks the state finals date at Williamsport Area High School, and World Finals will be held May 27-May 30th at the University of Maryland. ered over them caused them to be a little nervous. But as soon as the starting buzzer sounded, they were lost in a world of robotics and science, demonstrating their teamwork skills, perseverance, and ingenuity.

The FIRST Lego League theme for the year was Body Forward, so the newlyformed EC team decided to research a degenerative muscular disease called ALS, commonly known as Lou Gehrig's disease. Through an online video conference, students interviewed Mr. Greg Telthorster, who explained how ALS has changed his life and showed them the assistive devices he uses. The team was inspired and created a clever skit about motor neurons, the human body, and ALS. They proposed new technologies to make living with ALS better.

Then, they worked built and programmed an autonomous robot to solve biomedical engineering missions on the FIRST Lego League robot board. For months, they stayed after school or came on a Saturday morning. On January 8th, the team traveled to the FIRST State regional competition in Oxford, Pennsylvania. When the competition was over, they returned to East Vincent Elementary School with a sense of pride. As a rookie team, they met many of their goals, bonded as a team, and learned more than they expected about science, technology, and robotics.

Friends of the Arts (FOA) is a non-profit group that raises money to fund the arts and art activities for students in the Owen J. Roberts School District. FOA started as a concerned group of parents and teachers wanting to insure that there was fund-

FOA directly supports Artists in Residence who come to Owen J. Roberts schools and work with children teaching technical skills to create lasting art. North Coventry Elementary School is adorned with many striking works of art created by artists and students working together.

The annual Craft Show (this year was the 31st annual) is FOA's biggest fundraiser. This along with the Holiday House Tour, and Studio & Garden Tour each year allows FOA to fund field trips to museums and performing arts programs, artists in residence, assemblies, classroom supplies, art show prizes, framing for senior honor artist's work, scholarships for art camps for deserving students, scholarships for graduating seniors continuing studies in the arts, Art Goes to School, and other cultural activities.

FOA is always open to new members and new ideas. Everyone is invited to join their meetings at the North Coventry Elementary School on the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00 p.m.

The Girls' Crew did so by successfully competing in their first race against other high schools from around the mid-Atlantic region in November. The road to the race was challenging and successfully navigated by the girls organizing a team, securing baseline funds, finding a coach, a place to row, a boat, oars, associated equipment and time to



train both on and off the water.

This club sport is funded solely by the students through membership dues, club loans and this season, charity fundraising events. The team has sponsored Row-for-the-Heart – an all-day, indoor marathon rowing event held at Final Results Fitness, Sunday, February 27th. Proceeds benefit the team and The American Heart Association.

While the girls proudly and successfully pioneered the first season, a newly organized, companion boys program will help carry on this success the girls attained this fall. The addition of the boys squad has doubled the number of participants from 20 to approximately 40 students. Both squads row out of the Hines Rowing Center in Conshohocken, train up to six days per week and both plan on taking part in seven regattas this spring season. The first regatta this spring will take place Sunday, March 20th and culminate in the City Championship Regatta on Sunday, May 8th. All races will be on the Schuylkill River adjacent to Kelly Drive. Rocket Math Blasts Off!!

Basic facts mastery has long-reaching effects on students through secondary mathematics courses and in college or career. Students need a firm understanding and recall of basic facts in order to focus on higher level expectations which are being emphasized through middle school and high school mathematics courses. Mastery and retention of basic facts allow students to concentrate on learning the mathematical concepts with a deeper understanding.

Rocket Math, the District's basic facts program, was piloted in a number of during November and December. All of the first through sixth grade classrooms are now using Rocket Math daily. Students work at their own pace and set individual goals in the program. Parents can assist their children by practicing facts at home as a regular routine or when a practice sheet comes home from Rocket Math. This is just one example of how the Owen J. Roberts School District continues to believe that more math = more possibilities for students.

Inspiring young girls and women in 150 cities across North America, Girls on the Run is an organization with a mission to educate and prepare girls for a life-time of self-respect and healthy living through the training and preparation for a climactic 5K.

On December 11, 2010 this culminating event took place for over 600 Girls on the Run, Girls on Track and boys in the STRIDE programs of Chester County. Beginning and ending at Downingtown West High School, 1,500 runners took off at noon to conquer the 3.1 mile race through Downingtown. Every participant received a medal, though the smiles, hugs and high-fives at the finish line said it all. Each of the young athletes who completed the race won the gold in a sense of self-confidence and improved physical fitness. Founded in 1996 by Molly Barker in Charlotte, North Carolina, Girls on the Run was created to teach girls how to live outside the "girl box", or to live by their own standards, not the ones society imposes upon them. During a sunset run back in 1993, Molly Barker found the vision she needed to stop questioning her self-worth and image, realizing that no young woman should ever feel insecure. Through her teaching and coaching background, Barker created Girls on the Run. From the



the 5 kilometer race this season were Precision Print and Karen Colin DDS, without whom events like this would not be possible. Owen J. Roberts' sophomores Sarah Dowd and MaryGrace Keller dedicated their time to support East Coventry Elementary Girls on the Run as part of their Girl Scout community service along with volunteer and senior Robyn Flores. Two high school students from other schools were also part of the coach line-up--Autumn Recke and Nicole Sivieri. When asked her favorite part of the entire GOTR experience, Maddie, age nine, replied grinning, "I loved all of it." Girls on the Run benefits every person who participates. The impact of this program is truly a life-changing experience. Coach and teacher Kate Bender says this about her East Coventry Girls on the Run, "To see how excited they are after practice inspires me!"The excitement does not stop in December however, as of February 28, 2011 the spring season will begin and continue into early May, recruiting more 4th to 6th graders leading up to another 5K race. pilot launch of the 24-lesson curriculum with only 13 girls in '96, the program grew to become an international non-profit organization. By the year 2000, hundreds of thousands of women were ready to embark on their own coaching expeditions.

The prevention of depression, eating disorders, substance and alcohol abuse is just one of the objectives of Girls on the Run. Empowerment through running. For some of these girls, life is so simple right now, but for others, they may be starting to feel the pressure of their peers. All over the country, and in our own little corner of Pennsylvania, volunteers dedicate themselves from September to December to educate the next generation of women.
